After-School Policy

As the new school year approaches, the staff of Vinita Public Library is looking forward to serving many children and youth in the afterschool hours.

While most children use the library respectfully, some have caused problems in the past. It is important for parents and children to be informed about the library's policies on unattended children, behavior and acceptable uses of the library facility.

The Vinita Public Library welcomes and encourages children to visit the Library, use library resources and services, and attend library programs. Children not yet in third grade must be accompanied and directly supervised at all times by a parent or responsible childcare provider while in the library. Staff members are available to help and support children with normal library use; however, the Library is not able to provide short- or long-term

> child care, provide school supplies,

or be responsible for unattended children. Children often leave the library and we cannot monitor them. Children of any age who are unable or unwilling to care for themselves may not be left alone in the Library.

"Weekly Wednesdays" are hosted by Jewell Morgan in the Heritage Room from 3:00 to 5:00 pm, for games, crafts, and fun for third graders & up. The meeting room will be closed to the general public during this time.

Vinita Public Library provides public Internet computers and Wi-Fi access. A parent or guardian must give written permission for their minor children to use the library's computers.

Use of the Library requires respect for others who are also enjoying the library facilities and services. Behavior becomes unacceptable when it interferes with other persons' use of the library, when it could result in injury to oneself or others, or when it could result in loss or damage to




